Which ports and harbours do you most look forward to visiting?

The Krka Falls in Croatia and Bonifacio on Corsica is pretty awesome. The Similan Islands in Thailand are also very special.

What are your favourite onshore hangouts?

My wife and I have a small vineyard and olive grove in Tulbagh near Cape Town so it is always nice to go down there and drink our own wine in the evenings around a big fire and talk long into the night with family and friends.

What are the biggest changes you've seen in the industry?

Who is the most eccentric/strangest/funniest member of your crew?

Chief engineer Dave Shereda. He has the best redneck jokes and won't mind me telling you that he owns a leopard-skin thong!

Who was the most troublesome crew member you've worked with?

That would be back in 1999 in the Maldives when two crew members (brothers) were fighting in the galley and I stepped in to break it up. One of them got hold of a knife and tried to stab me! We calmed him down enough to cable tie him up and then locked him in a cabin for the night and flew him out ten hours later.

What's the most stressful part of your job?
